Saturday, 2 November at Edgmond

You can also widen your experience of ringing different bells, and widen your ringing social circle. Central Council AGM Weekend Part 2

In last month's Newsletter, Ann Williams, my fellow Central Council Rep., gave a full report on the Council's AGM that we both attended in Exeter at the end of September, mentioning some updates linked to the Ringing 2030 initiative. My contribution this month is to provide an update on some of the other discussion 'hot points' of the weekend essentially linked to the outputs of a ringing research project and activities linked to young ringers.

Risk to bells and ringing of possible church closures

Back in the Spring of this year, Simon Linford, recent ex-Central Council President, and Alison Hodge, who at the time was the Council's Stewardship and Management Workgroup Lead, undertook some work investigating the risk to bells and ringing with changing circumstances of churches, through possible closure or access limitations even if a building is not closed for worship. Simon and Alison reported their findings to a packed audience at a CC AGM Weekend 'fringe' meeting. Here's a shortish summary!

The general issue of reduced congregation sizes, increased difficulty in being able to fill church volunteer posts and pressures on financial resources has some high public awareness now through press and other media outputs. Certain dioceses are reviewing ministry and mission effectiveness, (including here in Lichfield with 'Shaping for Mission' which has been running for a while and which has now reached the phase of a new strategic framework being launched to move forwards to 2030).

As one example, the Lincoln Diocese has some major constraints with a very high density of church buildings in its area, a low average population per parish, the lowest level of financial giving in any of the Church of England dioceses and with only four benefices that actually cover the cost of their stipendiary clergy. In the Lincoln Diocese each church has been asked to try to grade itself into one of five categories - key mission church, local mission church, community church, festival church (to have a minimum of six services per year) or move towards closure. 34% of the churches (209 of them) put themselves into the last two categories which would represent 17 rings with five or more bells.

Overall, across many dioceses, churches at risk of major change (sometimes quite quickly) are often linked to being small rural parishes by population or in urban areas of deprivation and with a lower grading of architectural heritage. Also, generally those with a low attendance, or with unaffordable repair costs, or possibly with a lack of PCC members, churchwardens or other volunteers.

Ringers are encouraged to take active roles in their churches, and be more connected with them, so that any possible changes that may develop can be worked with. All churches with rings of bells should have at least one ringing PCC member for example. Ringers should also work closely with Diocesan DACs and their Bell Advisors. Over the next ten years, 10-15% of churches with bells could either close or find new uses.

There is much more detail associated with this research presentation on the website of the Central Council (search for its 2024 Annual Meeting) and our Association Committee has discussed the subject at an initial level at its September committee meeting. As an added note, some closure of churches with rings of bells reasonably local to the Shropshire Association are in process at the moment – Shareshill and Wood Green (linked to the Lichfield and Walsall Archdeaconries Society) and Berrington and Hereford, St Nicholas (linked to the Hereford Diocesan Guild).

Action for Young Ringers

One aspect of the Central Council's Ringing 2030 Strategy is a focus on Young Ringers, knowing that the current ringing population grew from a base of youngsters five times larger than what we have now. A new CC Young Ringers Workgroup has recently been established to lead progression with both school age and university ringing development. Initial work within this area has now led to the formation of a Young Ringers Hub (see https://yrhub.cccbr.org.uk/) with the aim of it being a "one stop shop" for all young ringers up to the age of 30, providing appropriate support and guidance in different threads – for those under 18 (including youth groups), the 18-30s, university ringers and resources for other ringing leaders. Other key components of the Workgroup are a Ringing in Schools project and initiatives looking at how youth ringing is led and organised. One very successful ringing development of recent times has been the Ringing World National Youth Contest held each July and which next year will be in Birmingham. Here in the Shropshire Association we will need to work on developing our young ringer base from the foundations that we already have in some of our towers across our area – help and suggestions will be gladly taken up by the Association's Committee so please don't hold back.
