Quarterly and Annual General Meetings Ellesmere, Saturday 11th January

Open ringing before the AGM ensured Ellesmere's generously sized ringing room was filled to capacity. The popularity of the meeting meant that a *lot* of 'Rounds on Eight' was rung, allowing up to four less experienced people to catch hold, most with a minder, bolstered by older hands in-between.

There was also a plain course and touch to cater for the Grandsire ringers; two courses of Stedman, the first of which included two ringers who are very new to it; and a creditable course of Yorkshire.

The short address focused on the gifts of the kings, linking gold to ringing in joyful celebration, myrrh to the marking of more sombre occasions and frankincense to the way the bells may remind people of the church's, and therefore God's, presence in their community.

Tony Freemont explained a change to Lichfield Diocese policy on safeguarding: the diocese is now asking all tower leaders to undertake the Level 3, Leadership, course in the Church of England's scheme.

Ann Williams outlined bookings already made for next year's Centenary, and asked us to reserve the dates. The most important are the Dinner at Hawkstone Park on Friday, 15th May, and the anniversary service and tea at St Chad's on Saturday, 25th July.

Training Morning Edgmond, Saturday 8th March, 10 – 12.30

The next Association training morning will be held at Edgmond, on 8th March. At our last meet, we invited students to nominate their choice of what they would like to learn and practise. This proved very successful and popular, so we will do the same again. Places are limited, so please get in touch, with your request, so that we can ensure we have enough experienced ringers to give you a worthwhile morning.

Training is one of the things I think this Association does well. Along with providing generous refreshments, of course. We want to thank all those who have baked and served the goodies, as well as all the willing helpers who make up bands or 'stand behind', making the training effective. As a learning opportunity, training mornings are far more useful than our quarterly meetings, and I would urge anyone who wants to progress their ringing to come along this year.

Training mornings are booked for Meole Brace in May, Moreton Corbet in July, and Edgmond is planned for November. In addition, we hope to run an event for our young ringers to get together. I would like to organise a forum for tower leaders and teachers to exchange ideas for effective training, and perhaps put some of them into practice together. I have been teaching ringing for more years than I care to remember, but I still like to glean new ideas from other tutors. And I especially want to encourage newer ringers who may be faced with running a tower or building up a band.
